



I-5 Repaving and Restoration Project

(Rehabilitating 40 miles of Interstate 5 in Merced, Stanislaus and San Joaquin counties)

The California Department of Transportation will rehabilitate 40 miles of Interstate 5 (I-5) in Merced, Stanislaus and San Joaquin Counties. Work is scheduled to begin in April 2015 and will continue into April 2016.

This \$51 million project begins at the Tom Paine Slough Bridge in San Joaquin County, just north of the Interstate 205 Interchange. The project will run the length of Interstate 5 in Stanislaus County, ending just south of the Merced/Stanislaus County line.

Communities that might be affected by the project include Newman, Crows Landing, Patterson and Westley in Stanislaus County; Gustine in Merced County; and Tracy in San Joaquin County.

Work will primarily be done at night, with at least one lane scheduled to be open in each direction. No work is scheduled for weekends or holidays. The project is funded with savings from the State Highway Operation and Protection Program.

Work includes:

- Repaving the roadway;
- Installing in-ground traffic detector loops for future volume counts;
- Paving on and off-ramps so they conform smoothly with local roads.

The project will ease congestion, improve mobility and reduce maintenance costs, while decreasing travel times and enhancing safety for all motorists.
