CALTRANS STATEWIDE LITTER PICKUP DAY

San Joaquin County – The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) held a statewide Litter Removal Day on Thursday, April 25, 2013, to pick up litter and debris along the state highway system and to educate the public about this costly issue.

Caltrans maintenance crews in San Joaquin County picked up over 730 bags of litter and debris for the entire day at the following locations:

- State Route 99 (SR-99) and SR-12 in Lodi;
- Interstate 5 (I-5) at SR-120 near the San Joaquin River;
- SR-4 near Daggett Road in Stockton
- SR-99 at SR-132 in Tracy;
- SR-99 at SR-108 in Oakdale.

Caltrans would also like to recognize **Temple Israel**, a San Joaquin County Adopt-A-Highway group, which picked up along I-5 from Peltier Road to Walnut Grove Road.

Last year, Caltrans spent \$52 million on litter removal, collecting enough litter, trash, and debris from freeways to fill more than 10,000 garbage trucks. Parked end-to-end, those trucks would stretch more than 50 miles.

In addition to the economic costs, litter presents a wide range of serious threats to the environment and human health: Wildlife can suffer from plastics in the environment; roadside vegetation can be damaged by large debris; fires can be started from burning cigarettes that can threaten human health; harmful chemicals and biohazards can cause a serious threat to human health, litter can clog roadway drainage systems that can lead to wet-weather highway flooding, congestion, and accidents. Litter can aid in the spread of disease.
