## SR-39 BEACH BOULEVARD ROADWAY REHABILITATION LANE CLOSURES

*(Beginning Late October, 2011)*

**Irvine**—The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) will begin a \$1.3 million roadway pavement rehabilitation project in the City of Huntington Beach, on the northbound and southbound lanes of SR-39 Beach Boulevard from Ellis Street on the north to SR-1 Pacific Coast Highway on the south.

This construction contract involves cold planning damaged AC pavement and replacement by overlaying rubberized hot mix asphalt. This contract will include replacement of pavement striping and markers, adjustment of water valve boxes, monument covers, resetting manholes to grade and replacing inductive loop detectors.

Estimate first working day will be Late October, 2011. Project has 60 working days.

**Night work** from 9 pm to 5:30 am (minimum of 1 lane open in each direction) for SB/NB Beach Blvd from Ellis to Adams Ave

**Day work** from 7:30 am to 3:30 pm for SB Beach Blvd from Adams Ave to PCH

**Day work** from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm for NB Beach Blvd from Adams Ave to PCH

Some grinding work will be necessary in this process, and areas along Beach Boulevard may experience some noise. Upon completion of the project, motorists will enjoy a smoother roadway. Every effort will be made to minimize the impacts of construction to residents and businesses.

As always, to ensure the safety of workers and the traveling public, in a construction zone, please remember to “**slow for the cone zone**”, “**move over**”, be alert, and proceed with caution.
