

### Project Description

Caltrans will begin work on a stretch of SR-1, Pacific Coast Highway, in each direction which includes resurfacing asphalt. The project limit is between Goldenwest Street and Beach Boulevard, in the City of Huntington Beach.

The project contractor will be All American Asphalt. The project cost estimate is \$1.1 million. The project will begin September 19, 2012 with an anticipated completion date of late November 2012.

The work being done is to preserve and extend the pavement life to provide a smoother surface that greatly enhances the ride quality along SR-1.

### Project Details

The purpose of the project is to overlay existing pavement with rubberized hot mix asphalt (RHMA) in both directions. It also includes adjusting utility manholes, installing loop detectors and applying new pavement delineation.

Some grinding work will be necessary in this process and areas along/ near Pacific Coast Highway may be impacted by noise. Every effort will be made to minimize the impacts of construction to residents and businesses.

Crews will be working Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Caltrans will provide any necessary updates to this schedule in advance.

### Planned Closures

The project will require lane closures of SR-1. One lane will remain open in each direction at all times. The closures will impact the local community commute, residences and businesses. Construction signs alerting commuters of the construction activity will be posted.
