## STATE ROUTE 43 AND LACEY ONE-WAY TRAFFIC CONTROL SCHEDULED FOR NEXT WEEK

The Department of Transportation (Caltrans) announces scheduled one way traffic control at the intersection of State Route 43 and Lacey Boulevard near Hanford in Kings County. These closures will be necessary to allow construction crews to work on the current signal light installation project at this location.

**The following lane closures will be in effect next week (weather permitting):**

**Northbound and Southbound State Route 43 will be reduced to one way traffic control, on Monday, October 29<sup>th</sup>, Thursday, November 1<sup>st</sup> and Friday, November 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2012 between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. each day. There will be no work at this location on Tuesday, October 30<sup>th</sup> or Wednesday, October 31<sup>st</sup>.**

**Westbound and Eastbound Lacey Boulevard will be reduced to one way traffic control, on Monday, October 29<sup>th</sup> through Friday, November 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2012 between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. each day.**

**Construction Crews will be conducting one way traffic control during this time with the use of flagging personnel through the work zone. Commuters are reminded to obey flagging personnel and pay close attention to road construction vehicles and personnel.**

**During construction operations, delays can last for up to 15 minutes. Commuters are encouraged to avoid this area during project work hours and use alternate routes if possible.**

Caltrans and CHP want to remind the public about the "Move Over" law signed by the governor in January of 2010, that requires motorists to slow down and, if safe, move over to a lane not immediately adjacent to a stationary CHP, Emergency or Caltrans vehicle displaying flashing warning lights. To date, 45 other states have enacted similar laws requiring motorists to move over or slow down. Violation of this law is punishable by a fine and citation. So remember...
