Most of the focus was on Stimulus II (Jobs Bill) and strategies to implement the proposed bill; the State budget and the impacts of the proposed gas tax swap; the Prop 1B TCIF shortfall; and federal re-authorization, including transit, goods movement, capacity program and maintenance. The consensus of the group was to use the seven federal principles already adopted as the key issues for California, which are to ensure the financial integrity of the Highway and Transit Trust Funds; rebuild and maintain transportation infrastructure in a good state of repair; establish goods movement as a national economic priority; enhance mobility through congestion relief within and between metropolitan areas, strengthen the federal commitment to safety and security, particularly with respect to rural roads and access; strengthen comprehensive environmental stewardship; and streamline project delivery. Ms. Rhinehart further reported that these top seven key issues for California will be used for discussion purposes both at the State and federal levels in preparation for the next re-

CTC is in the process of hiring a consultant to assist in the review of the proposal, with recommendations for Commission consideration at the April or May meeting.</p> <p>Stephen Maller, CTC Deputy Director, presented the 2009 4th Quarter Toll Bridge Program Oversight Committee Report.</p> <p>Ms. Linda Bohlinger, Chair of the California Transportation Foundation, presented the 2nd Annual CTC Scholarship to Kristen Carnarius from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo.</p>

On January 28, the Federal Railroad Administration announced that Department received \$99 million in Recovery Act grants for nine projects to improve rail passenger operations. Finally, Mr. Iwasaki reported on various groundbreaking, including the Route 50 Bus/Carpool Lane and Community Enhancement Project in Sacramento, and the upcoming groundbreaking of the Route 10 Coachella Valley Corridor Improvement Project in Riverside.

12	Report by Federal Highway Administration Division Administrator	1.11	<p style="text-align: center;">Information only.</p> <p>Topics included: Upcoming expiration of federal highway and transit programs on February 28. Unless Congress acts to extend the programs, billions of dollars and hundreds of thousands of jobs are in jeopardy. The Senate will consider an extension which would ensure that states can maintain their transportation programs and prepare for the oncoming construction season. Both the House bill, “Jobs for Main Street”, which was passed in December and the pending Senate Jobs bill would extend federal funding for highways and transit programs while the Congress works on a multi-year authorization, provide \$19.5 billion for the Highway Trust Fund to ensure that funding is adequate to continue the programs, and repair the baseline for the highway program to at least maintain last year’s funding levels.</p> <p>With regard to Recovery Act (ARRA), California has a total of 912 state and local ARRA projects obligated valued at \$3.9 billion, including \$2.5 in ARRA funds. All funds have been obligated.</p>

To fix the performance of the highway system, Mr. Moore suggested that the Department set specific, achievable performance goals, track the progress, and use them to drive decisions. He suggested that projects must be prioritized objectively, not politically; administrative costs must be reduced; study practices of more efficient states; and get State debt under control.</p> <p>Mr. Moore also suggested that California look more to Public Private Partnerships to improve service levels and save costs, as well as new project partnerships for faster delivery, costs savings, and new sources of funding.</p>
